MEET YOUR KEYNOTE SPEAKER

JEAN-LOUIS FABIANI, 2018 ENCATC CONGRESS KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Jean-Louis Fabiani, member of the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, USA and Professor at the Central European University in Budapest will share his critical reflection on the current cultural dynamics/transformations and their implications in terms of heritagisation - interconnections between past, present, and future making practices and legacies.

Jean-Louis Fabiani has been professor of Sociology at the Central European University in Budapest since 2008. Born in 1951 in Algiers (Algeria), he studied at the Ecole normale supérieure and received his PhD in 1980 from the EHESS (Paris). From 1980 to 1988 he was agrégé-répétiteur then maître-assistant at the Department of Social Sciences at the Ecole normale supérieure. In 1988, he moved to the administration of culture, being appointed as Director of Cultural Affairs in Corsica. He went back to the academic world in 1991 when he joined EHESS, first in Marseilles, then in Paris in 2002. He is the author of eleven personal books. He was the chairman of the board of the Mediterranean Youth Orchestra from 1998 to 2014.

WHAT IS THE CULTURAL HORIZON?

Actors in the world of culture, practitioners as well as thinkers, have lived in a rather simple world for a long time. The horizon was quite clear: a better world was possible through the improvement of diverse cultural tools: thanks to a better management, to the definition of clear and homogeneous goals and to a common, albeit vague, conception of Europe, we could use the concept of culture in the singular. This relative consensus is dead: identity politics and neo-nationalism have imposed the plural. Cultural wars are no longer only symbolic fights. They can be war tout court. We thought that the patient construction of ways of peaceful communication and of a common heritage would lead us to an eternal cultural spring. This is not the case. The necessary recognition of the Other, that was our common goal, tends to be replaced by her silencing. Regretting the past is not a solution. The current critique of the myth of a homogenous European culture has some positive effects: it forces us to adopt a more reflective way when using tools and concepts that we tended to take for granted. The Bucharest Congress is crucial in envisaging the reframing of

our endeavours in troubled times. We can't consider that Europe is hegemonic in the realm of culture any longer. Other voices exist that claim equal legitimacy, and even more, the deconstruction of the very concept of legitimacy. Europe is no longer the dominant voice, and we must think that it is a very good thing. For the time being there is neither a new hegemony in sight nor a form of emerging consensus about cultural values. The Global South remains guite heterogeneous while the production centres of cultural industries remain largely in the North, in spite of emerging soft powers. What should we do? As Europeans, we must subtly navigate between two reefs: the temptation of the guilt trip on the one hand; the proliferation of neo-nationalist invented narratives on the other hand. As non-Europeans, we should not only demand equal consideration for our cultural endeavours; we have to invent new forms of production and diffusion that would be in line with the decolonizing imperative, and bring real innovation to cultural life and cultural policy. We must say that, at least for the time being, Europeans will not buy the story portraying them as the bad guys in history: in the current conjuncture, the radical "decolonial" view will just increase the level of cultural violence. Some activists are just sorcerer's apprentices. But we must fight also the discourse of cultural roots that leads to invented traditions and worse, to the spreading of fake news. If nobody believes that music softens the mores any longer, we should not let it prepare the war. The professionals of culture have a central role in the redefinition of the ways by which we talk together without fighting each other. The European ideal is not obsolete, if only we avoid self-imposed guilt and absurd hatred.



LOCAL CURRENCY AND EXCHANGE

The Romanian Leu is the currency of Romania. The currency symbol is lei. The currency code for Lei is RON. You can change dollars and euros at the airport or by card at a bank ATM machine. Depending on the bank or exchange office, 1 euro is about 4.7 lei, but it is always advised to check daily conversion rates.

LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

ATTENTION! Payments are made only in the national currency. Bucharest's public transport system is the largest in Romania and one of the largest in Europe. It is made up of the Bucharest Metro, as well as a surface transport system run by RATB, which consists of buses, trams, trolleybuses, and light rail. In addition, a private minibus system operates in the city.

Transportation from the airport to the center of the city can be made by car (taxi or Uber services) or by bus: 783 Express Line which will leave you at the Unirii Square (Piata Unirii) in the center of Bucharest (as final destination). The 783 Express Line busses run at intervals of 40 minutes and Bus stops are located in front of the arrivals terminal and departure terminal. The magnetic card with two trips costs 7 lei (less than 2 euros – check the link (<u>http://www.ratb.ro/expres.php</u>). There are 16 stations to the center (Unirii Square) which is also the end of the Express 783 line. The schedule of this bus (<u>https:// bit.ly/2IIOfwq</u>).

Taxi services: Rates between 1.39 and 3.50 lei / km (price between 6 and 15 euros).

The local organizer strongly advises you to use the Uber services (in order to avoid using the taxi services). Through the Uber APP you can select cash payment and most of the drivers know English.

ABOUT THE CITY

Bucharest (Romanian: București) is the capital and largest city of Romania, as well as its cultural, industrial, and financial centre. It is located in the southeast of the country, at 44°2557N 26°0614E Coordinates: 44°2557N 26°0614E, on the banks of the Dâmbovița River.

Bucharest hosts the Romanian Presidency, Government, Parliament and all main national public institutions.

Economically, Bucharest is the most prosperous city in Romania and is one of the main industrial centres and transportation hubs of Eastern Europe. The city has big convention facilities, educational institutes, cultural venues, traditional "shopping arcades", and recreational areas.

The city proper is administratively known as the "Municipality of Bucharest" (Municipiul București), and has the same administrative level as that of a national county, being further subdivided into six sectors, each governed by a local mayor.

Bucharest's crime rate is rather low in comparison to other European capital cities.

Bucharest's public transport system is the largest in Romania and one of the largest in Europe. It is made up of the Bucharest Metro, as well as a surface transport system run by RATB, which consists of buses, trams, trolleybuses, and light rail. In addition, a private minibus system operates in the city.

Bucharest has a growing cultural scene, in fields including the visual arts, performing arts, and nightlife. Unlike other parts of Romania, such as the Black Sea coast or Transylvania, Bucharest's cultural scene has no defined style, and instead incorporates elements of Romanian and international culture. Therefore Bucharest is the most eclectic city in Romania.

A BRIEF HISTORY

Bucharest's history dates back to the early settlements in antiquity, more than 2000 years. The city was founded (1459) by one of the most renowned Romanian rules: Wallachian Prince Vlad III, also known as "The Impaler" (top image right). In Western Europe he was called "Dracula" due to the famous novel. And yes, "Dracula" was the founder of today's Bucharest!

The Old Princely Court (Curtea Veche) was erected by the then Prince of Wallachia Mircea Ciobanul in the mid-16th century. Bucharest became the permanent location of the Wallachian court after 1698 (starting with the reign of Prince and Saint Constantin Brâncoveanu (bottom image right) – founder of the Brâncovenesc architectonical style, also known as the Romanian Style).

In 1859, after the unification of Moldova and Wallachia (under Prince Alexandru Ioan Cuza), Bucharest was elected as capital of the Romanian United Principalities. After that it continued to be the capital city of the Romanian Kingdom (under King Carol I) and the capital of the Kingdom of Greater Romania in 1918 (following the Grand Union after the Great War, under King Ferdinand).



ABOUT THE CONGRESS VENUE

The 2018 ENCATC Congress will be hosted at the **Romanian Ministry of Culture** in Burcharest. The *Romanian National Institute of Historical Monuments*, part of this ministry, maintains the List of historical monuments in Romania. The list, created in 2004-2005, contains <u>historical monuments</u> entered in the <u>National Cultural Heritage of Romania</u>.



FUN FACTS

Bucharest was nicknamed the **Little Paris** due to its Parisian and eclectic architecture during the interwar period.

In 1857, Bucharest entered history as the **first city in the world where lamp lighting** was introduced.

Bucharest is the 6th largest city in Europe.

Bucharest was one of the first cities in Europe to introduce as means of transportation the **omnibus with horses**.

In Bucharest were signed 5 international treaties, all known as Treaty of Bucharest (between the Ottoman Empire and the Russian Empire; between Serbia and Bulgaria; between Bulgaria, Romania, Serbia, Montenegro, and Greece; between Romania and the Central Powers; between Romania and the Entente Powers).

Elena Văcărescu was born in Bucharest. She was the **only woman to serve with the rank of ambassador** (permanent delegate) in the history of the League of Nations. In 1925 she was (the first woman) welcomed as a member of the Romanian Academy.

Mircea Eliade was born in Bucharest. He was a leading interpreter of religious experience, who **established paradigms in religious studies that persist to this day.** His theory that hierophanies form the basis of religion, splitting the human experience of reality into sacred and profane space and time, has proved influential.

TIME TO BRUSH UP!

Romanian is a phonetic language, so words are pronounced as they are spelled. If you've studied other Romance language, such as Italian, Spanish, French or Portuguese, you may feel at home sooner than you think.
