A dynamic three-day programme took participants on exciting cultural tours and had them interacting with leading cultural management and policy experts and influencers operating in New York's vibrant and fast-paced arts and cultural scene. It was part of the <u>ENCATC Study Trip to New York City</u> that also includes the <u>7th ENCATC Academy on Cultural</u> <u>Relations and Diplomacy: "The Rising Role of Cities".</u>

This International Study Tour was a once in a lifetime chance to learn about arts and cultural management in one of the most iconic cities in the world. The three-day intensive programme in New York City fostered an international exchange of ideas, projects and best practice through study visits, lectures, cultural tours, and debates.

Many of the visits included behind-the-scenes access revealing new perspectives and insights into the day-to-day management of world-renowned arts and cultural institutions. The programme also set the context for the 7th ENCATC Academy on Cultural Relations and Diplomacy: "The Rising Role of Cities" (15-16 February) by having visited key arts and cultural institutions that are playing important roles in the city's cultural external relations.

educators, researchers, creators, cultural 33 professionals, cultural entrepreneurs, and decision makers from 7 countries gathered in New York City from 12-14 February for the 7th ENCATC International Study Tour, an initiative of ENCATC organised in partnership with ENCATC members, NYU Steinhardt and the Association of Arts Administration Educators (AAAE).

A question seemed to resonate throughout the different cultural visits: how does NYC do to stay competitive and rank among the top leading cities in the field of culture and creativity year after year?

Talks with some of the most relevant actors in the city's cultural policy and management shed some light on this issue, with participants gaining insights on NYC's cultural planning, the latest infrastructural developments, curatorial programmes, design policies, business models and innovative projects being developed.



ENCATC International Study Tour to NYC

REPORT—Day 1



The Study Tour started on Monday 12 February 2018 with a cultural visit to <u>The High Line</u>, an out-of-use railroad converted into a public park, highly used by both locals and visitors, displaying artworks, and symbolising a long-lasting community advocacy effort to preserve the structure.

The next visit was to <u>The Whitney Museum of</u> <u>American Art</u> and to see its remarkable exhibition "An Incomplete History of Protest". Here, participants were welcomed by **Jane Carey**, Community Affairs Manager, Visitor Experience. The museum has community programmes that build sustained connections that go beyond the single museum visit, bringing art, ideas, and dialogue to classrooms, senior centres, and community-based organizations around the city.

At the <u>David Zwirner Gallery</u>, its Director Veronique Ansorge welcomed the group and focused her presentation on some of the main challenges galleries face nowadays, from finding the balance between quality and quantity, and the need to adapt to the art world becoming more and more digital.

A highlight of the day was surely the talk with Laurie Beckelman, Associate Director at <u>The Shed</u>. This new multi-arts centre is being built at the Hudson Yards and will open its doors in 2019. Besides its amazing architectural design – with a movable structure that allows it to have a "deployed" and a "nested" position, and multiple variations of the internal elements distribution, what makes of The Shed a truly unique project is the fact that its artistic programme, directed by Alex Poots, will be 100% artist-driven, with works specifically commissioned and designed for The Shed.

ENCATC International Study Tour to NYC

REPORT— Day 2



On the second day of the Study Tour, 13 February 2018, **Sarah Henry**, Chief Curator and Deputy Director of the <u>Museum of the City of New York</u>, guided the participants through the exhibition "New York at its Core", which organised the past, present and future of the city around four main concepts linked to it in the people's imagery: money, diversity, density and creativity. The Museum of the City showed an impressive use of digital and interactive installations which, in the words of Henry, "*allow to diversify the collection, capturing the stories of people which are not captured by traditional objects*".

In the afternoon, **Quincy Houghton**, Director of Exhibitions at <u>The Metropolitan Museum of Art</u>, and **András Szántó**, Moderator of the Global Museum Leaders Colloquim and also advisor at The MET, discussed with participants about the museum's global outreach, and the specifics of this international dimension in the case of US institutions, where museums provide on certain occasions the role of a non-existing cultural ministry. Houghton and Szántó also reflected on the fact that "*large visitors numbers do not necessarily mean a better museum in terms of visitors' experience*," and the need to stay true to one's missions and to not programme for attendance only.



ENCATC International Study Tour to NYC

REPORT—Day 3



An intensive programme was prepared for the third and last day of the Study Tour, the 14 February 2018. After an optional visit to Freedom Tower, participants visited The Oculus and talked to Isolde Brielmaier, Executive Director of Arts, Culture and Community at Westfield World Trade Center. Brielmaier the explained the opportunities and limitations for artists to work in a private-owned, commercial space, very unique in its design, and located in a highly symbolic space for the city as a whole, next to the 9/11 memorial. She also explained the artistic and cultural programme developed at the Westfield World Trade Center, which includes a forward-facing dimension (with a big screen showing audio-visual artworks and two big installations happening inside The Oculus every year), and a "behind the scenes" dimension corresponding to an educational programme addressed to children and other community groups.

After lunch, **Tom Finkelpearl**. Commissioner at the New York City Department of Cultural Affairs, presented the new plan <u>"CREATE NYC: a Cultural Plan for All New</u> <u>Yorkers"</u>, built from extensive public engagement, with the principles of diversity and social impact playing a major role. In fact, this is New York City's first-ever cultural plan. Nearly 200,000 residents, from every corner of the city, stepped up to share their priorities, concerns, and ideas about how we can make sure that -here in New York- **culture is for everyone**.

The day, and the Study Tour, ended with a visit to the <u>9/11 Memorial Museum</u>, where Jan Ramirez, Executive Vice President of Collections and Chief Curator, and **Danielle Hodes**, Assistant Public Programmes Manager, talked about the specifics of a memorial museum and explained the curatorial work done in this particular case. The group also talked about how to engage visitors around sensitive topics and curatorial challenges. "In terms of programming, the museum has also faced challenges in shifting the public perception of the institution being solely a memorial into an active space of exchange of ideas and experiences."







ENCATC Academy on Cultural Relations and Diplomacy: The Rising Role of Cities

The 2018 edition of the <u>ENCATC Academy on</u> <u>Cultural Relations and Diplomacy: "The Rising Role of</u> <u>Cities"</u> explored the complexity of the cultural dimension of city diplomacy. It was part of the ENCATC Study Trip to New York City that also included the <u>7th ENCATC International Study Tour</u>.

The speed and scale of urbanisation in the world is unprecedented. Thus it is not surprising that the rise of city diplomacy is challenging the monopoly of the state in diplomacy. Increasingly, cities, on their own merits, as well as building on networked arrangements, are an important actor in international relations. The cultural dimension of their activity is complex comprising interconnected economic, social, political and environmental strands.

The ENCATC Academy, an initiative of ENCATC was organised in partnership with Goldsmiths University of London and hosted by NYU Steinhardt, both members of ENCATC, was a unique learning experience combining lectures with on-site visits, different from other offers currently available. Leading experts from Europe and North America who are renowned figures in the cultural diplomacy and international relations fields, higher education, and policy - delivered comprehensive and in-depth knowledge on the role cities play in cultural diplomacy.

36 academics, researchers and cultural practitioners from 7 countries gathered in New York City from 15-16 February for a two day programme offering insights and experiences in many areas. First, participants were introduced to understand the historical background and the contemporary issues faced by cities in international cultural relations, It was the occasion to explore the role of cultural leadership linking the local and the global. Great attention was put on the diversity of roles arts/ cultural organisations can have in relation to state diplomacy and local cultural engagement. The Academy has also been an experience that underlined the links between international, state and local actors operating in cultural relations and diplomacy, witnessing how cities, culture and conflict can link among them, envisaging how culture must be at the heart of sustainable urban development.



ENCATC Academy on Cultural Relations and Diplomacy: The Rising Role of Cities REPORT—Day 1



The first day of the Academy, 15 February 2018, kicked off at the NYU Torch Club with an introduction "The Risina Role of Cities" bv Carla to Figueira and Gerald Lidstone, from Goldsmiths, University of London. Among many other issues, Figueira pointed at how cities have a much more flexible level of engagement compared to states and this is one of their strengths. Furthermore, cities also identify artists as significant stakeholders and culture is an important component in most city rankings. Lidstone highlighted the growing importance of associations which are based on trust and common thematic interests, rather than political ones. He illustrated this idea with the case of the Hay Festival, which has created several major new international book festivals through collaboration with overseas partners.

As a continuation of the talk with Tom Finkelpearl on Tuesday 14th, during the 7th ENCATC International Study Tour, Nisha Baliga, Director of Participatory Planning at Hester Street, and Catherine Green, Founder and Executive Director at ArtsEast New York, talked about "CREATE NYC: a Cultural Plan for All New Yorkers" and, more specifically, about the wide consultation process put in place to gain inputs for the elaboration of an inclusive and highly participated plan. They discussed about the challenges to work on such a massive endeavour at a city level, and highlighted the importance of being transparent about what can be changed and what cannot, as well as of investing time on building trust and providing feedback to the community in a circular process, not only "collecting information" in a linear process.

In the afternoon, six speakers tackled a wide range of topics adding up to the general discussion on the rising role of cities: from specific cultural initiatives and spaces at the city level to international collaboration projects.

John P. Waters, Clinical Assistant Professor in Irish Studies at NYU, talked about the shifting cultural policy within the Irish Government, and the highly centralised cultural structure and budget in the capital, Dublin.

Leslie Koch, Former Director of the Trust for <u>Governor's Island</u>, talked about this project as an open, cultural space embodying the values of NYC. She described Governor's Island as a "*shared space for art and play, created for and by New Yorkers*", where it is proved that art and play can live together and authorship of experiences is shared by everyone in the space. Donna Walker Kuhne, Senior Advisor of Community Engagement at the <u>New Jersey Performing Arts</u> <u>Centre</u>, President of the <u>Walker Communications</u> <u>Group</u> and Adjunct Faculty at NYU Performing Arts Administration Programme, described the approach followed in some cultural projects in challenging contexts from the community perspective in the city of New York – such as how they brought together the predominantly rich and white, and the migrant community, separated by the railway in New Jersey, through the arts. She concluded that "*It is all about knowing who is in the room, who has the power to make the decisions, and how do I respect everyone's culture*".

Andy Teirstein, Arts Professor at NYU and Director of the Translucent Borders Project presented this initiative exploring the role of music and dance at different borders. This project, from the Working Group of NYU's Global Institute for Advanced Study, is exploring ways that dancers and musicians can act as catalysts for creative engagement across geographic, cultural, and economic borders. Since 2015, Translucent Borders has facilitated global conversations between dancers and musicians in the Middle East, Greece, Cuba, and Ghana through interviews, knowledge-sharing circles, master classes, improvisatory lab work, and collaborative performance.

For her intervention. Leila Tamari, Program Officer at the National Creative Placemaking Fund – Art Place America discussed on the definition of creative placemaking and described some of the projects supported by this fund. Over the past 7 years, this initiative has invested over \$100M in supporting artists as allies in equitable community development.

Finally, Karen Wong, Deputy Director of the <u>New</u> <u>Museum</u>, shared the experience of <u>IdeasCity</u>, an initiative of the museum to reflect on the role of arts and culture for the future vitality of cities that is being replicated in other cities across the world.

ENCATC Academy on Cultural Relations and Diplomacy: The Rising Role of Cities REPORT—Day 2



With the aim to use the acquired knowledge from the Academy's first day, participants were taken into the field to see applied examples of the role of the cities in Cultural Relations and Diplomacy.

On Friday 16 February 2018, the group visited The Museum of the Chinese in America, which promotes dialogue and understanding among people of all cultural backgrounds, bringing 160 years of Chinese American history to vivid life through its innovative exhibitions, educational and cultural programs. The group learnt about the past and present history of migration of the Chinese community in the city of New York and the country more widely, thanks to the guidance through the collection of Herb Tam, Curator and Director of Exhibitions at the museum.

The final visit took participants to The Tenement Museum, which preserves and interprets the history of immigration through the personal experiences of the generations of newcomers who settled in and built lives on Manhattan's Lower East Side. The group was guided by Andrew Rebatta, Curator of the exhibition "FOLD: Golden Venture Paper Sculptures", to learn the story of two families who lived there and about the American immigrant experience.





"Reflecting about which role the museum can play when facing the turmoil in the contemporary issues such as immigrants, refugees, and so on, there was a discussion whether the museum will be able to provide further help, but could change people's attitudes through slower process and softer methods.
